#### **DELEGATION TO QUINTE WEST COUNCIL**

On 19 March 2025 WACO delegation presented to Quinte West Council with an overview of the Wooler Schoolhouse Project highlighting plans to renovate the historical building and return it to community services. WACO also asked Council to consider putting in place a program to provide property tax relief for groups maintaining a heritage property such as The Wooler School. Council voted to support the proposal, asking city staff to examine putting in place such a program in Quinte using guidelines provided by the Province of Ontario. ### WACO APPROVED FOR FEDERAL GRANT

On 22 March 2025 WACO received a letter from the Federal Minister for Housing, Infrastructure and Communities, the Honourable Nathaniel Erskine-Smith announcing that The Wooler Schoolhouse Project was approved for a \$1,000,000 grant under the Government of Canada's Green and Inclusive Community Infrastructure Program. The grant will support the renovation including the modernization of its building and energy systems and the addition of an elevator and new exit to bring the building up to modern safety and accessibility standards. WACO will work with the program over May and June to put in place a funding agreement through which 80% of eligible renovation costs will be paid by the Federal government.

### <u>HISTORIC BITS</u>

The Creeks
Cole or Cold Creeks

The Creeks By Dianne Brearley

From the beginning the kids in Wooler never had a community centre with a hockey arena or a swimming pool. They were not deprived, however: they had something better. They had the creeks.

Wooler has two creeks, Cold Creek, a relatively deep and fast moving stream and Dead Creek, a tributary so called because it often almost dried up in the hot summers. When I was a kid at the beginning of the fifties, we called them "cricks" until our teacher, Mr. Tompkins, told us that was an illiteracy and they were "creeks". It was a good place to find painted turtles. We loved to pick up these gentle creatures, not to be confused with the fierce snapping turtles, and admired the beauty of the markings on their shells. We sometimes brought them up to the house and put them in the water trough under the pump in the backyard. We piled up stones so they could climb out. They humoured us, and when our backs were turned, they took off in the direction of the creek.

When I was searching for photographs taken by my great grandfather, D.S. Austin around 1900, I found several. The oldest one (above) dating from the late 1800's, shows ten men, a boy and a dog with a string of trout. I recognized two of the men: my great grandfather William Bell second from the right and my great grandfather Nicholas McColl third from the right. The label says "Trout Fishers, Cole Creek, Wooler. For some time I thought D.S. had made an error writing "Cole"instead of "Cold'.

Recently, however, a relative of the Cole family told me that she had heard the creek was originally named "Cole" possibly because the Cole family, who were early settlers, had farms on Old Wooler Road. Her grandfather was Caleb Cole and his farm was at the junction of Old Wooler Road and Lord Road next to the old Hennessy home. The Cole family homestead was about a mile west down the road from his farm, opposite the Catholic Cemetery. The homestead is now torn down but after her great aunt Zoa Cole passed away in the 1970's, it was the site of a Buddhist retreat for many years. At some point the name of the creek was changed to Cold Creek.
